Trondheim Municipal School of Performing Arts is the largest arts and music school in Norway (with app. 4000 pupils), and has for 20 years been the basis of the great music milieu in town. Through hard work and never ending enthusiasm headmaster Kåre Opdal managed to convince the city council that music education is very important. He introduced the "mini-violin", "Saturday School" and always encouraged chamber music as an important part of the student's education. He retired autumn 1994 but is still active in the musical life of Trondheim. The present city council and Mayor of Trondheim are pleased to recognize the importance of chamber music among young people by especially to honour Kåre Opdal, naming the third prize after him.

Trio Skandinavia qualified in 2014 to participate in the finals of "Ung och Lovande Chamber Music Competition 2015" in Věsterås, Sweden. They also qualified for the Trondheim Competition Academy in 2014, but could not participate due to concert engagements. Van Kuijk Quartet has been selected to take part in the ProQuartet Academy, which gives them the opportunity to study with Günter Pichler, Heime Müller, Rainer Schimdt. They also had lessons with Kitahama Reiko (Ravel guartet) and Luigi Vecchioni (Manfred Quartet). After performing in the Radio France show "The Appointment" with Laurent Goumarre, the Van Kuijk Quartet has appeared in several concerts such as "Festival des Forêts" in 2011 alonaside the pianist Dana Ciocarlie and "Festival Ars Terra" in 2012. They will perform this year at festivals such as "Connaissance des Jeunes Interprètes" in Gavaudun, "Rencontres Musicales ProQuartet en Seine-et-Marne" and Gaveau Hall in Paris with Angelika Kirchschlager. The Van Kuiik Quartet became in February 2013 laureate of the FNAPEC competition, obtaining two awards, the grant from the Academy of Fine Arts and the special ProQuartet-CEMC prize.

Anthony Marwood

Chairman of the Jury

Trondheim International Chamber Music Competition is delighted to present violinist Anthony Marwood as head of the jury. London-born Anthony Marwood is internationally renowned both as soloist and director, collaborating with ensembles around the world, such as Australian Chamber Orchestra, Les Violons du Roy, Saint Louis Symphony, BBC Symphony Orchestra, Tapiola Sinfonietta, Irish Chamber Orchestra and London Mozart Players. Anthony regularly collaborates with composers, and violin concertos composed for him include Adès "Concentric Paths", Beamish's 1995 concerto, and Mackey's "Four Iconoclastic Episodes". EMI released the Adès concerto recording in 2010 to widespread praise. Anthony Marwood's most recent CD features Schumann's violin sonatas, released on the Wigmore Live label, following on from the recording of Brahms violin sonatas both with Aleksandar Madžar. Recent releases include Schumann's late works for violin and orchestra, and Britten Violin and Double Concertos with BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra. He studied with Emanuel Hurwitz at Royal Academy of Music, David Takeno at Guildhall School of Music, and took lessons from Sandor Vegh and Daniel Phillips at IMS Prussia Cove. For 16 years he was violinist of the Florestan Trio.



lan Brown

Pianist Ian Brown is a is a musician of great versatility whose career embraces chamber music, solo and duo playing and conducting. As concerto soloist he has appeared with many of Britain's leading orchestras playing a diverse solo repertoire from Bach to Rachmaninov and Bartók. Performances have taken him all over the world. As a duo partner he is in great demand, working with musicians such as Mstislav Rostropovich, Henryk Szeryng, Ruggiero Ricci, Elisabeth Söderström, Felicity Lott, György Pauk, Ralph Kirshbaum and James Galway. He became pianist with The Nash Ensemble in 1978 and during this long association has played at all the important British music festivals. He has recorded extensively with them, performing a large chamber music repertoire from Haydn to the present day. He has performed much contemporary music and has also commissioned new keyboard works. He was the soloist in Messiaen's Oiseaux Exotiques at the Proms and toured Germany with the BBC Philharmonic Orchestra in concerts celebrating composer H. W. Henze's 60th birthday.



Øyvind Gimse

Øyvind Gimse is Artistic Leader of the Trondheim Soloists and a distinguished cellist and orchestral leader. After studies with Walter Nothas, Frans Helmerson and William Pleeth, he held position of solo cellist in the Trondheim Symphony Orchestra for seven years. He has toured as a soloist with the Trondheim Soloists in Norway, Britain, Italy and Spain. His performances with Anne-Sophie Mutter and the Trondheim Soloists in Europe and at the Carnegie Hall in 1999 and recordings with her and the ensemble for DG, have received the highest critical acclaim. In addition his own work as Artistic Leader of the Trondheim Soloists has resulted in the group receiving no less than five GRAMMY® nominations for their last two recordings in 2004. Since 1997 Gimse holds the position of Professor of Strings at the Department of Music (NTNU) in Trondheim.



Soo-Jin Hona

She is violinist in Trio Con Brio Copenhagen and 1st Concert master in Denmark Radio Symphony Orchestra. Founded in Vienna in 1999, Trio con Brio Copenhagen has an intensive worldwide touring schedule. In recent years the trio has appeared in the world's major concert halls, such as Tivoli Concert Hall, Concertaebouw, Carneaie Hall, Wiamore Hall, Konzerthaus Berlin, Seoul Arts Center, Bunka Kaikan Tokvo, and Teatro Olimpico Vicenza, The trio has won most of the international competitions for piano trio, including ARD (Munich), Vittorio Gui (Florence) and Norway's Trondheim Competition. In January 2015 the trio will be first ensemble to receive "P2 Artists Prize" in Denmark. Other major awards received include Kalichstein-Laredo-Robinson International Trio Award (USA) and "Allianz Prize" in Germany's Festspiele Mecklenburg-Vorpommern. The trio's début CD was praised by critics, and their Mendelssohn CD was chosen by Classic FM, UK as Chamber Disc of 2011. Soo-Jin Hong teaches at the Royal Academy Copenhagen.



Juliet Jopling

The English violist Juliet Jopling studied at Royal College of Music, London, with David Takeno at Trinity College, Cambridge, and Thomas Riebl of the Mozarteum, Salzburg, Juliet has appeared as soloist with The Brandenburg Philharmonic, the London Soloists Chamber Orchestra, and the Philharmonia. She won prizes both at the 1997 and 2000 Lionel Tertis International Viola Competition, Juliet has worked in the Chamber Orchestra of Europe, Ensemble Modern (Frankfurt), The London Mozart Players, the English Chamber Orchestra, and as visiting head of viola groups at Camerata Academica Salzburg, Norweaian Radio Orchestra KORK. Oslo Philharmonic among others. She was one of the founders of Ensemble Sándor Véah, and The Quince Quartet: prize winner at the Banff International String Quartet Competition 2004. Juliet is violist in the Engegård Quartet and principal violist at the Norwegian National Opera Orchestra.



Aleksandar Madžar

Serbian pianist Aleksandar Madžar was born in Belgrade in 1968. He studied piano in Belgrade, Moscow, Strasbourg and Brussels. He holds professorships at Royal Conservatoire, Brussels and Hochschule für Musik und Theater, Bern. Madžar was awarded 3rd prize at the XII Leeds competition. The competition propelled Madžar onto the UK scene where he also became a sought after soloist with the Royal and BBC Philharmonics, BBC Scottish Symphony, Scottish Chamber Orchestra and BBC National Orchestra of Wales, as well as throughout Europe and Asia. Aleksandar Madžar's current performance schedule includes various select partnerships such as violinists Anthony Marwood, Ilya Gringolts, and soprano Juliane Banse. His discography includes the two Chopin piano concertos, with the Frankfurt Radio Symphony Orchestra and Dmitri Kitaenko for BMG/Classic FM (1997).

Christian Poltera



Born in Zurich, Christian Poltéra is regarded one of the most prominent cellists of his generation. As soloist he has worked with orchestras such as the Munich Philharmonic Orchestra, Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra, NDR Hamburg Orchestra, Oslo Philharmonic Orchestra, BBC Philharmonic, Camerata Salzbura and many more. Mr. Poltéra also devotes himself to chamber music, working with musicians as Gidon Kremer. Christian Tetzlaff, Leonidas Kavakos, Martin Fröst, Kathryn Stott, Lars Voat, and Leif Ove Andsnes, as well as the Auryn, Belcea, and Zehetmair Quartets. In 2004 he received the Borletti-Buitoni Award and was selected a BBC New Generation Artist. In 2006-07 he was 'Rising Star' of the European Concert Hall Organization. His discography includes the cello concertos by Dvorak, Lutoslawski, Dutilleux, Schoeck, Honegger, Martin, and Toch, as well as chamber music by Prokofiev, Fauré, Mozart, Saint-Saens and Schubert. The recordings have been honored with the Diapason d'or, Gramophone Magazine's "Editor's Choice", Strad Magazine's "Strad Selection", and BBC Music Magazine's "Choice".



2016 COMPULSORY PIECE

"IOCUS", scherzo for piano trio by Bjorn Kruse

The latin word "locus" means joke. And so it is the very appropriate title for our set piece "locus", composed in year 2000 by the Norwegian composer Bjorn Kruse. Born 1946 in London, Bjorn Kruse grew up in England, USA and Norway, with studies at UCLA, California, and The Norwegian Academy of Music in Oslo, receiving his BA (clarinet major) in 1975 and his Diploma in Composition two years later. He has taught at the academy since 1976, becoming professor of composition in 1997. Since 2013, he has retired from the Academy as Professor Emeritus. He has written two books on jazz theory and one on composition and drama, "Thinking Art – composition and process".

FINALE HOST



Our finale host, pianist and composer Wolfgang Plagge, was born in Oslo in 1969. At the age of 4 he started playing the piano and made his first attempts as a composer at the same age. His made a remarkable debut as a pianist at the age of 12, with His Majesty King Olav V present. He is a distinguished pianist working all over the world, has made several recordings for the labels 2L. SIMAX, Crystal and Norske Gram, and is in great demand as a chamber musician. Wolfgang Plagge published his first compositions at the age of 12. His works covers a variety of genres, from church music to symphonic music, his chamber music and pianoworks being central. His music is performed by soloists, ensembles and orchestras all over the world. With his great knowledge and love for chamber music we find Wolfgang to be the perfect host, leading us through the intense FINALE of the Trondheim Competition 2015.

TICC 2015 ARTWORK/ ARTIST

Sverre Andreas Koren Bjertnæs, was born in Trondheim in 1976. 15 years old he had his first exhibition in connection with the Nerdrum-school. His first separate exhibition came in 2000. Characteristic of his early period (1997-2004) are big portraits of youth. In 2004, with the exhibition "Incognito", he left the "teenage innocence" that characterized the early pictures, and entered the darker worlds of drug use, black light, urban scenes, pop culture, and public bathrooms. He studied with Tore Bjørn Skjølsvik, Odd Nerdrum, at Oslo National Academy of the Arts, and ArtEZ Hogeschool voor de kunsten, Enschede Netherlands. In 2005 he won the Anders Jahre Young Artists Prize.



HISTORY OF PIANO TRIO

Chamber music was one of three general classifications of music at the beginning of the 17th century - the others being church music and theater music (the wellspring for opera and symphony). Each had its own conventions of style and function. At the time, "chamber" referred to ensemble music for voices and instruments performed at small gatherings, usually at court or at home. By the mid-18th century, under the impact of classicism, chamber music came to signify many of the characteristics it has today. Music for a small instrumental ensemble, performed in an intimate setting by amateurs or professionals, stressing personal expression and the conversation among players, rather than virtuosic display or leadership by a conductor.

The history of the piano trio is rich and diverse, stemming from the prolific father-figure Haydn. But his circa forty trios are essentially keyboard sonatas with sing-along strings attached, on either hand. It took the dramatist Mozart to give the cello an individual role with a voice of its own, which has been declaiming memorable melodic lines ever since. But that measure of emancipation soon led to keen competition, further intensified by technical developments among instruments and performers. Over the centuries, the piano trio has gained a repertoire of exceptional size and richness; works written for this genre include some of the greatest of all chamber works.
